The world had changed. It was January, and I was on the terrace outside my apartment, gazing out across the lake. A strong wind was gusting that morning. It came from the east, and I held a cup of coffee in my hand. I was wearing a thick coat and had no idea what was coming. Everything was uncertain; the world was in upheaval. I was nearly forty-four, mid-life. I liked January, and I especially liked the clarity of January days. Only in January were they this clear. I huddled my coat tighter around my neck, and when I closed my eyes the lake sounded like the sea, and I thought of Santiago, of his aged face and young eyes, of the way he'd stood by the shore and looked out across the sea, after eighty-four days without catching a thing, and then set sail. I saw him stand there by the sea and saw him climb into the boat and glide across the water. The old man in that boat would never return; someone else would. And I thought back to 2003, the year that everything changed.

It had all started, however, two years earlier, in the summer of 2001. We had survived Y2K and emerged into the new millennium fit and well, if a little hungover, contrary to various experts who had predicted the end of the world.
