›The Cow‹ is a magnificent novel, which happens to be about cows and dairy workers, but which transcends its immediate theme to become a powerful and moving piece of fiction about man, his work, and his food at the end of the twentieth century.

Not since Herman Melville has an author so powerfully and intricately explored the life- and death- cycle of an animal preyed upon by man.

From pasture to dairy to abattoir, Sterchi follows Blösch, the lead cow of farmer Knuchel's herd, describing in exquisite prose each detail – glorious and stomach-turning – of bovine existence.

At the same time Sterchi creates a modern-day Ahab named Ambrosio – a dark-skinned Spanish guest-worker in milk-white Switzerland, who is not pristine enough, according to the Swiss, to handle live cows, and who is thus relegated to cutting up dead ones.

Starting with these two unlikely characters, Sterchi creates a monumental and important work of fiction about beast and men, about how they prey upon each other and upon themselves.

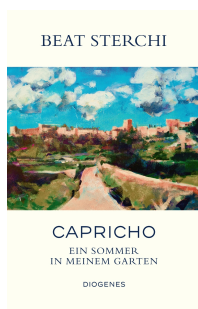
