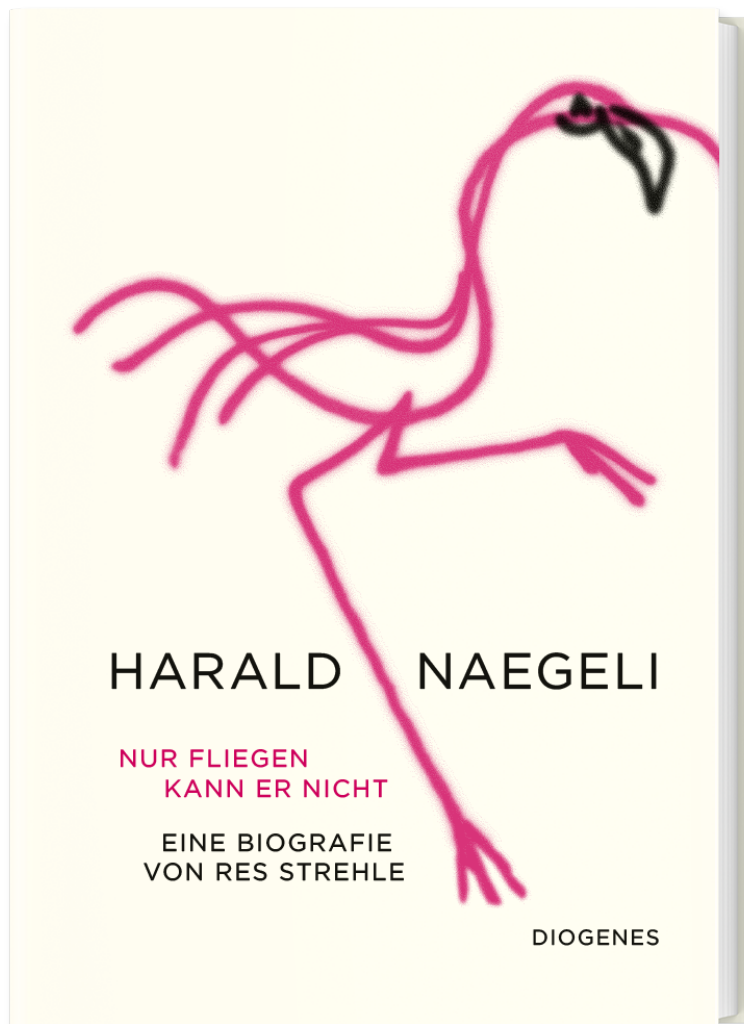


Res Strehle & Harald Naegeli (Ill.)

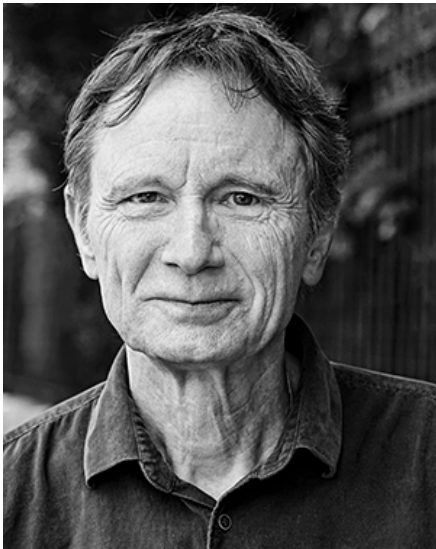
