



Reiner Zimnik (1930 - 2021) was born in Bytom, grew up in Lower Bavaria, and drew from the age of four. Reiner Zimnik was awarded a number of prizes (including the >Eichendorff Prize<, >Munich Art Prize for Graphic Design< and a scholarship at the Villa-Massimo).
